

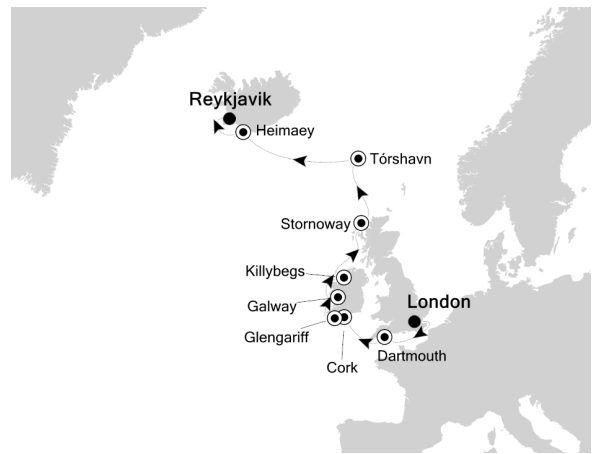

General Information

ORGANISED SHORE EXCURSIONS

Booking Direct with Silversea gives you peace of mind. Our local tour operators are fully insured and have been comprehensively vetted. In the unlikely event of issues with a Silversea tour, we assume responsibility and the ship will wait for our delayed shore excursion. These are important factors when comparing value. Looking for a special program with your travelling companions? In a nod to our Italian heritage, let us reserve for you our Silver Shore "Privato" service - a private vehicle with driver and/or guide. Create your own itinerary or leave it to us. This service is available in most ports which you can reserve on MySilversea (my.silversea.com) or at the Shore Concierge desk onboard for a truly tailor-made arrangement. Please bear in mind as we traverse many far reaching destinations, the local infrastructure varies and is beyond our control. Road conditions and vehicles available locally may not be up to standards we are accustomed to. Guides and drivers may speak with a heavy accent at times depending on the port of call. Be assured however that at Silversea, we contract only the best tours and best operators available at each destination. Please Note: Silversea reserves the right to make any changes or modify a tour in case of unforeseen circumstances and/or to ensure the safety and comfort of our guests.

BOOKING & CANCELLATION DEADLINES

Shore excursions must be purchased on or before the booking deadline for each port of call. Tours are available on a first-come, first-served basis; some tours are very popular with guests often ending up being wait-listed: in order to avoid disappointment, it is therefore suggested to book in advance via my.silversea.com from 120 - 7 days prior to sailing. Last-minute requests to participate on excursions are subject to space availability, which in some cases may not be determined until departure time pier-side. Please note that certain shore excursions may have different reservation deadlines and may incur cancellation fees if cancelled after the deadline. Unless otherwise indicated in the tour description for a particular shore excursion a 100% cancellation fee will be charged for shore excursions cancelled within 48 hours of the scheduled start time. If changes or cancellations are required once onboard, tickets must be returned to the Shore Concierge desk within the cancellation deadline period.

ONLINE ADVANCE RESERVATION OF SHORE EXCURSIONS

For those of you that are not aware, at Silversea you can pre-reserve your excursions at leisure prior to your journey on the internet, log on to MySilversea (my.silversea.com) up to 7 days prior to your sailing date. If you have pre-reserved your excursions on line, your tickets will be delivered to your suite upon embarkation and all charges will be billed to your shipboard account.

ON BOARD RESERVATIONS

Once on board, you may also reserve and purchase your shore excursions. You will find a consolidated tour booking form in your suite and at the Shore Concierge desk. Select the tours in which you wish to participate, then leave the completed and signed form at the Shore Concierge desk prior to the booking deadline indicated. Tour tickets will be delivered to your suite and your selected excursions charged to your shipboard account. Overland and exclusive excursions must be pre-paid by credit card through your reservation agents. If still available they may also be purchased on board. Shore excursions require a minimum number of participants in order to operate as described. If this minimum number is not met, Silversea reserves the right to offer the programme at a different rate or to cancel the specific departure.

SHORE EXCURSION PRICING

Prices are generally quoted per person, per tour, with the exception of Silver Shore Privato or group-designated excursions. Prices are subject to change without notice. Please visit MySilversea (my.silversea.com) for the most up-to-date information. Discounts for children under 12 years of age are available on some, but not all tours. Prices for children, if available, will be adjusted onboard. Please meet with the Shore Concierge team prior to your excursion to discuss the availability of children's pricing.

ON-TIME TOUR DEPARTURES

As a courtesy to fellow guests, tour departures generally will not be announced unless there is an unforeseen change. Departure times from the ship are published in the ships daily newspaper, the Silversea Chronicle. Guests are kindly requested to proceed ashore at least ten minutes prior to the tour departure time. The Shore Concierge team will be pier-side to direct you to the appropriate transportation. When the ship is at anchor, guests must allow additional time to tender ashore.

Silversea Cruises reserves the right to adjust itineraries and tour departures as local conditions dictate. Please note that pier departure times are also listed in MySilversea (my.silversea.com)

TOUR SUITABILITY

At Silversea we offer a broad range of activities for our guests of all physical capabilities. Some excursions are decidedly only for the physically fit and active guest. Each excursion offered is clearly identified with an activity level to assist you. For your safety and enjoyment and that of your fellow guests, please be certain you're selecting excursions that meet your physical capability. We therefore encourage guests to review the tour description carefully including the PLEASE NOTE section which includes useful information and attend the port talks onboard. If you still have any questions or concerns regarding this, please contact Shore Concierge (shoreconcierge@silversea.com) prior to your cruise or visit the Shore Concierge desk for more detailed information once onboard.

ONBOARD SHORE CONCIERGE TEAM

Whether you wish to participate in an organised shore excursion or bespoke tailor-made tour, Silversea's experienced Shore Concierge team are happy to assist you in ensuring your shore-side experiences are nothing less than a memory that lasts forever.

The Shore Concierge team is available onboard on sea days from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Office opening hours in port may vary whilst staff is shore-side assisting you on tour. Please refer to the Silversea Chronicle for daily office opening hours.

When contemplating a tailor-made program onboard, please contact the Shore Concierge team as early as possible at the beginning of your cruise, as time may be a factor in reaching local contacts. Please be aware that once arrangements have been confirmed, 100% cancellation fee will be applied. Unfortunately, we are unable to change or cancel airline tickets, car rental, hotel or any other reservations you made previously with your travel agent or on your own. In many ports of call there may be a local hospitality representative on board to provide additional information, for two hours after the ship's arrival. In some ports, local information may be found in the tourist information centre ashore.

PORT TALKS

Throughout your cruise we'll be offering Port & Shore Excursion information given by our Shore Concierge Manager and Destination Consultant prior to arrival in each port of call. Our aim is to give you a travel experience that goes beyond the ordinary and many of your questions about our ports of call will be answered in these briefings, giving you more time to enjoy and immerse yourself in each port. The information is presented in the theater or is pre-recorded and played on your in-suite entertainment system.

SILVERSEA SHUTTLE SERVICE

Complimentary transportation may be provided by Silversea when the local town is beyond a reasonable walking distance from the port. This service may not be possible in ports where a strong taxi union exists, preventing Silversea from providing a complimentary shuttle. The availability and schedule for this service will be announced onboard and listed in the Silversea Chronicle. We are not able to advise this in advance. Operationally, intervals between shuttle bus departures could be affected by local traffic. Silversea is not liable for any unforeseen delays. There will be a break in service for driver meal times. Shuttle service is offered during the day only. The shuttle service is designed to augment local transportation; guests requiring more flexibility may prefer not to wait for a shuttle and secure a taxi at their own expense.

CHILDREN ON TOUR

To ensure the safety of our younger guests, participation by children in certain shore excursions may be restricted. To ensure the safety of our younger guests, children up to the age of 8 years old are only permitted to participate in suitable Silver Shore Excursions and the shuttle service, if the vehicles are equipped with the correct safety harness and seating equipment, to accommodate a child. Such harnesses' and secure seating cannot be guaranteed. Alternately guests may use their own approved safety seat, booster seat or harness as long as they are compatible with the local touring vehicle and can properly secure the young guest. Silversea reserves the right to refuse children under the age of 8 years old on any tour on the basis of safety.

GRATUITIES

Gratuities for local guides and drivers are not included in the excursion price. It is customary to tip tour guides and drivers. Such gratuities if extended, should be done so on a voluntary, individual basis.

MOBILE TELEPHONES

As a courtesy to fellow guests, kindly refrain from using mobile telephones while on tour so as not to interfere with the guide's explanation. Most tours make frequent stops, allowing time for guests to use their mobile telephones. We appreciate your understanding in this matter.

SMOKING

For reasons of safety and comfort, smoking is not permitted on any tour vehicles used by Silversea. Your understanding in this matter is appreciated.

VIDEO/PHOTOGRAPHY CHARGES

At some museums, sites and monuments, photography and/or the use of video cameras may not be allowed or may incur a charge. These charges are not included in the tour price and are at guests' own expense.

SHOPPING STOPS

While our organised excursions are not generally geared to the serious shopper, some tours allow for short shopping stops as indicated in the tour description. In the interest of all tour participants, guests should adhere to the allotted time and return to the tour vehicle promptly as advised by the tour guide or ship's escort. Silversea does require that establishments be reputable, of general interest to our guests and offer quality goods. However, all purchases are the responsibility of the individual.

Dartmouth - United Kingdom

DTM-A / DARTMOOR AND BUCKFAST ABBEY

DIFFICULTY



Price:\$99; Duration:4.50 hrs



Embrace the scenic splendour and legacy of Dartmoor and Buckfast Abbey during this panoramic, half-day sightseeing excursion.

Devon Countryside Drive

Depart the pier for a panoramic overview of Dartmoor. Pass through the fertile Devon countryside, and by rolling farmland and wooded hillsides. See trees, hedgerows and flora at the entrance to small farming and agricultural communities, which are home to clusters of centuries-old houses and buildings. Devon's most famous export, clotted cream, is one of the delicious products of the rich pastures that stretch in broad sweeps throughout the area.

Dartmoor National Park

Continue on to Dartmoor National Park. Steeped in legend and myth, your guide will recount of some of the age-old stories of this vast wilderness. Pass the Victorian prison at Princetown as you head into the heart of Dartmoor. Pause for photographs at scenic points along the way.

Free Time in Buckfast Abbey

Next, re-board your coach for the journey to Buckfast Abbey, originally founded in Saxon times. Here, some free time is made available to browse the well-stocked gift shop, stroll around the complex, take in excellent views of the Abbey, or just relax and take in the serenity of Buckfast. At the conclusion of your visit, re-board your coach and commence the approximately one-hour drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking, at times over uneven surfaces and inclines, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach. Walking at Buckfast Abbey is at the discretion of each guest. This tour is suitable for guests with limited mobility and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Warm, layered clothing, a waterproof jacket or coat, sturdy, closed-toe hiking shoes, an umbrella, and sun protection are recommended. Due to the local climate most of the coaches are air-cooled.

DTM-B / SLAPTON SANDS AND ENGLISH CREAM TEA

DIFFICULTY



Price:\$99; Duration:4.50 hrs



Experience the traditions and World War II history of Dartmouth during this scenic and informative, half-day sightseeing excursion.

Torcross, Sherman Tank, Ken Small Memorial Speech, War Memorial

Depart the pier for the scenic, approximately 30-minute drive to Torcross. Upon arrival, see a Sherman tank and listen to Dean Small, son of the late Ken Small, explain the significance of this remote stretch of beach and recount the story of how his father recovered the Sherman tank. In addition, visit a war memorial given by the United States in 1954 to the 3,000 local inhabitants in gratitude for them evacuating their homes and land to provide a battle practice area for the successful assault in Normandy in June 1944. Their action resulted in the saving of many hundreds of lives, and contributed in no small measure to the success of the D-Day operation.

Slapton Sands, War Memorial

Next, re-board your coach and drive to Slapton Sands. Here, American forces conducted exercises in the Slapton Sands area to train units and staff in embarkation, landing on hostile shores, and seizing and holding a beachhead to cover the landing of follow-up forces. Slapton Sands was chosen because it resembled the Normandy beaches of Utah, where landings would take place on D-Day. It was here in 1944 that Allied forces held a secret dress rehearsal for D-Day. Unfortunately, speedy German E-boats interrupted the exercise, and hundreds of U.S. soldiers died. During your guided visit, tour the beach and its war memorial.

Blackawton or Kingsbridge, English Cream Tea

Leaving Slapton Sands, re-board your coach and continue on to Blackawton or Kingsbridge. Upon arrival, proceed for a quintessentially English cream tea. At the conclusion of your visit, re-board your coach and commence the short drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking, at times over uneven and sandy surfaces, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach. This tour is suitable for guests with limited mobility and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Guests who utilise a wheelchair must have a collapsible wheelchair, are able to make their own way on-and-off the coach, and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. Warm, layered clothing and a weatherproof jacket with flat, closed-toe walking shoes and sun protection are recommended. Guests must be at least three years old to participate on this tour. Due to the local climate, most of the coaches are air-cooled. Space on this tour is very limited; we suggest you book in advance to avoid disappointment.

DTM-C / COUNTRYSIDE STEAM TRAIN AND THE ENGLISH RIVIERA

DIFFICULTY

Embrace the stunning natural splendour of the English Riviera and countryside during this picturesque, half-day sightseeing excursion.

Scenic River Dart River-Boat Ride

Following a brief guided stroll of this historic naval town, depart the pier via river-boat for the leisurely, approximately 1.5-hour cruise up the River Dart. Along the way, pass through deep countryside surrounded by green hills. The light-green fields and patches of red plough-land stand out in striking contrast to the dark tones of the trees that line the banks for much of the way. Marvel at the rich, diverse bird, mammal and plant life, as well as the literary and historical connections, as you slowly cruise along this scenic river.

Totnes, Paignton, Steam Train-Ride, Seascapes, and Rocky Cliffs

Totnes is an ancient market town and river port situated at the heart of the beautiful Dart Valley. Upon arrival, enjoy a brief walking tour of charming Totnes before boarding a coach for the drive to Paignton, another crown jewel of the English Riviera. Board the Paignton & Dartmouth Steam Railway for a panoramic, approximately 30-minute ride through magnificent scenery, which ranges from seascapes with fine golden beaches to rocky cliffs rising dramatically from the waters of the English Channel.

River Dart, South Devon, Torbay, Kingswear Ferry, and Dartmouth

From here, travel alongside the tranquil River Dart as it passes through rolling wooded valleys, glorious South Devon scenery bordering the coast around Torbay, across the wooded hills and down into the Dart Valley as it nears the sea through an ever-widening estuary. Upon arrival at the riverside town of Kingswear, where the houses rise on the steep hill-side, de-board the train for the short walk to the ferry. Embark the ferry and cross the River Dart, then disembark the ferry at Dartmouth tender back to the ship.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking, at times over uneven and cobblestone surfaces, steep hills and inclines, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach, board/de-board the train and embark/disembark the river-boat. Walking in Paignton and Totnes is at the discretion of each guest. This tour is not suitable for guests with limited mobility and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Warm, layered clothing, a waterproof jacket or coat, sturdy, closed-toe hiking shoes, an umbrella, and sun protection are recommended. Due to the local climate, most of the coaches are air-cooled. The ferry is not exclusive to Silversea guests. The tour sequence may vary. Space on this tour is very limited; we suggest you book in advance to avoid disappointment.

DTM-D / GREENWAY HOUSE AND GARDENS

DIFFICULTY

Explore the life, home and career of renowned crime novelist and playwright Agatha Christie during this scenic, half-day riverboat excursion on a ferry to her Devon holiday home.

Scenic River-Boat Ride

Depart the pier via river-boat for the leisurely, approximately 40-minute cruise up the River Dart. Along the way, pass through deep countryside surrounded by green hills. The light-green fields and patches of red plough-land stand out in striking contrast to the dark tones of the trees that line the banks for much of the way. Marvel at the rich, diverse bird, mammal and plant life, as well as the literary and historical connections, as you slowly cruise along this scenic river.

Devon and Greenway House

Nestled on the banks of the River Dart, Greenway is the former Devon holiday home of Agatha Christie, renowned crime novelist and playwright, and the best-selling author of all-time. Agatha Christie loved nothing better than escaping with her family to Greenway, which she described as the loveliest place in the world. Her family gave Greenway to the National Trust in 2000; following major restoration work, the house opened to the public in 2009. After disembarking the river-boat, begin your guided tour of Greenway. This beloved family home takes you on a 1950s holiday, and paints an intimate portrait of Agatha Christie not only as a writer, but as a mother, wife and hostess.

Greenway House and Gardens Tour

During your visit, view the many personal collections and mementoes of this famous mystery writer and her family. Greenway's garden is exceptionally beautiful, with an atmosphere of romantic wilderness and mystery. The pleasant rambling paths scattered with primroses, bluebells and ferns are contrasted by formal gardens lined with herbaceous borders, tender shrubs, ferns, camellias, and vinery. Renowned for its rare, half-hardy plants and drifts of wildflowers, the garden's wonderful layout commands breath-taking views. At the conclusion of your visit, embark the river-boat and commence the approximately 40-minute ride back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking, at times over uneven surfaces, steep hills and inclines, with a few steps to negotiate to embark/disembark the boat. This tour is not suitable for guests with limited mobility and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Warm, layered clothing, a waterproof jacket or coat, sturdy, closed-toe hiking shoes, an umbrella, and sun protection are recommended. Backpacks and/or oversized bags are not permitted in the house. Storage lockers are located next to the reception area, in the courtyard and opposite house, and free-of-charge. The ferry is not exclusive to Silversea guests. Space on this tour is very limited; we suggest you book in advance to avoid disappointment.

Cork (Ringaskiddy) - Ireland

RNG-A / BLARNEY CASTLE & IRISH COFFEE

DIFFICULTY



Price:\$99; Duration:4.00 hrs

Begin your tour with a drive around Cork, Ireland's second largest city, affectionately known as the 'City of Steeples and Bridges. The main streets are flanked with spacious sidewalks and illuminated by unique lighting that evokes Cork's former glory as one of Europe's main sea-ports.

Blarney Castle

After this charming drive through the lush countryside, depart city and continue to the Blarney Castle. This massive, 15th-century castle is famous for its legendary Blarney Stone, embedded in the castle wall. The stone's power is said to bestow the gift of eloquence on anyone who kisses it. To do so, you must climb the 109 steps to the battlements, lie on your back, with someone holding you, and bend down to kiss the overhanging stone. The less agile may simply enjoy the magnificent views from the castle grounds. These were laid out in the 18th-century and contain a grove of trees and pretty dells with a circle of large stones known as Rock Close.

Blarney Woollen Mills

After enjoying the stunning view and the rich history of this castle, partake in some Irish coffee and some shopping time in the Blarney Woollen Mills, offering a large selection of Irish goods.

Please note: This tour involves an extensive amount of walking with 1.5 miles (2.5 kilometres) however it is all at the guests' discretion. This tour is not suggested for guests with limited mobility or those guests who utilize a wheelchair as there are 120 steps to reach the Blarney Stone however guests in wheelchairs and/or with limited mobility can enjoy the grounds of the Castle. The line to kiss the Blarney Stone can be long, we appreciate your patience. There may not be sufficient time to reach the Stone. Lightweight, comfortable clothing, a light sweater or jacket, flat, closed-toe walking shoes and sun protection are recommended. Guests must be at least 21 years old to be served alcoholic beverages. The tour sequence may vary.

RNG-E / CORK CITY AND WHISKEY TOUR

DIFFICULTY



Price:\$109; Duration:4.00 hrs

This tour takes you through the lush countryside for a panoramic tour of Cork City, affectionately known as the City of Bridges and Steeples. Visit the Old Midleton Distillery, the home of distilling to-date in Ireland

Cork's Steeples and Bridges

Board the coach for a drive through Cork. The main streets are flanked with spacious sidewalks and illuminated by unique lighting that evokes Cork's former glory as one of Europe's main sea-ports. Pass the French Gothic styled St. Fin Barre's Cathedral whose imposing steeple is a landmark in the city. From Cork take a short 30 minute drive to the Old Midleton Distillery.

Old Midleton Distillery

Enjoy a guided tour of this unique industrial complex. The sense of heritage is everywhere at the Jameson Experience. Some of the original buildings date back to 1795, built as a mill before being converted for use as a distillery. The water wheel, which once operated all the machinery at the distillery, still turns and operates the cogs and wheels in the Mill Building, where visitors can also admire one of the original steam engines installed in the latter half of the 19th century. The Still House is always a tour highlight, the three original pot stills still gleaming like burnished gold. One of these pot stills, installed in 1949, can hold 31,000 gallons (141,000 litres), making it the largest pot still in the world. Sample a glass of whisky before enjoying some free time to walk around and take photos of the distillery's exterior.

Afterwards re-board your coach and depart for Cork and your ship.

Burren Region and Cliffs of Moher

Depart the pier for the scenic, approximately 1.5-hour drive south, through the towns of Oranmore and Kilcolgan, before reaching the Burren region, a mythical area of majestic mountains, limestone rock formations and spectacular landscapes. Upon arrival, a visit is made to the awe-inspiring Cliffs of Moher. The most-visited natural attraction in Ireland, they are enjoyed by more than a million visitors annually. Rising high out of the Atlantic Ocean, the Cliffs of Moher soar to a height of approximately 657 feet (about 200 metres) at their peak and extend for approximately five miles (about eight kilometres). The cliffs have been immortalized in film, notably in 'The Princess Bride' as the 'Cliffs of Insanity', and in 'Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince', among others.

The Cliffs of Moher have several viewing platforms, including the main platform overlooking the south cliffs. The north platform, the highest one at the cliffs, rises 700 feet (about 213 metres) above sea level. On a clear day, you can see the distant Aran Islands. The Cliffs of Moher are home to major colonies of cliff-nesting seabirds. Designated a Special Protection Area (SPA) for Birds, the Cliffs of Moher are populated by 20 species of nesting birds, including nine species of breeding seabirds. The Cliffs of Moher Visitor Experience, an environmentally-sensitive, interactive exhibit, is built into a hillside to preserve as much of the natural landscape as possible. Inside, view interactive, themed displays and a virtual-reality film, *The Ledge*, which enables you to experience life at the cliffs, both above-and-below sea level.

Aillwee Caves

Next, re-board your coach and proceed for lunch at a local restaurant on Ireland's West Atlantic coast. After lunch, re-board your coach and drive into the heart of the Burren. Here, discover the Aillwee Caves, some of the oldest in Ireland. The Irish name, *Aill Bhúí*, means 'yellow cliff', and these caves were cut into the limestone by the melting waters of the prehistoric Ice Age. Upon arrival, take a guided walking tour through the dark and wondrous caverns, past rock formations and ancient artefacts, and even a thundering waterfall. See various artefacts and treasures, and feel the cool spray from its waters. Back in the sunshine, be sure to stop by the gift shop, which sells local crafts, before re-boarding your coach and commencing the approximately one-hour drive back to the pier.

Kylemore Abbey and Victorian Walled Garden

Every year, the standard of gardening gets closer to Victorian perfection.

Clifden, Lunch and Free Time

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Leaving Kylemore, re-board your coach and drive through the wild and rural countryside to Clifden. Upon arrival, proceed for lunch at a local restaurant. After lunch, some free time is made available to explore the Clifden at your leisure. Known as the 'Capital of Connemara', Clifden has emerged as one of Ireland's most sought-after holiday destinations, where visitors and local people mingle, giving the town a unique and enjoyable cosmopolitan flavour.

Recess, Derryneen, Twelve Bens Mountains and Roundstone Bog

Following your visit to Clifden, re-board your coach for the approximately two-hour drive back to the pier. En route, marvel at the ever-changing landscape of this truly wondrous place as your journey through Recess, Derryneen and Maam Cross. From the rugged Twelve Bens mountain range in the north, through lake-rich Roundstone Bog and to the golden beaches reaching out into the Atlantic Ocean, it's easy to see why Connemara is regarded as the 'real emerald' of Ireland.

Glencolmcille Folk Village

En route, pass through charming towns, the lovely countryside and northwest County Donegal. Upon arrival at Glenveagh National Park, proceed to the Visitor's Centre. Self-Guided Electric Bike-Ride, Mountains, Lakes, Glens, Woodlands, and Waterfall

There is much to see-and-do during your leisurely, self-guided, electric bike-ride. The park spans over 40,000 acres (about 16,187 hectares) of mountains, lakes, glens and woods, and is a wonderland of natural beauty. Trails are clearly marked, and your bike makes it easy to manoeuvre through the woodlands. Feel free to ride to the waterfall that sits at the head of the glen, and gently cascades down a hillside of rock and scrub. The park also features approximately 247 acres (about 100 hectares) of natural and semi-natural woodland. As you continue your travels, pass by oak, birch, hazel, yew and aspen trees towering over lush green carpets of mosses and ferns.

Deer, Falcons, Eagles and Bird Species

Be sure to have your camera handy for an opportunity to photograph red deer, peregrine falcons and the occasional golden eagle that reside in this park. Bird lovers should listen for the wood warbler, a rare bird in Ireland, but an annual visitor to Glenveagh. The best way to locate one is to listen for its unique call, which sounds like a coin spinning on a plate. At the conclusion of your visit, return your electric bike to the Visitor's Centre, then re-board your coach and commence the approximately 1.5-hour drive back to the pier.

Paddy was a deep sea fisherman for 20 years, but now has a Master's Degree in Archaeology. Artist and chef Siobhán is an artisan baker.

Tí Linn Café & Craft Shop, Slieve League Cliffs, and Coastal and Atlantic Ocean Views

Upon arrival at the Tí Linn Café & Craft Shop, transfer from the centre to a mini-bus and drive to the Slieve League Cliffs. At a height of approximately 1,968 feet (about 600 metres) above sea level, the Slieve League Cliffs are believed to be Europe's highest sea cliffs. Due to its remote setting, Slieve League boasts an unspoilt natural landscape. A photo stop is made at the Slieve League Cliffs Viewpoint for spectacular panoramic views overlooking the coast and Atlantic Ocean.

Tí Linn Visitor's Centre, Tea/Coffee with Scones, Craft Shop, and Art Gallery

Following your visit, re-board your mini-bus for the drive back to the Tí Linn Café & Craft Shop. Upon arrival, proceed for tea/coffee and delicious scones, freshly-made by Siobhán Clarke, at the Tí Linn Visitor's Centre. Afterward, some free time is made to browse the craft shop, which offers a large selection of local and national crafts, from photographic works and knitwear to jewellery and rustic furniture. The Tí Linn Art Gallery also has works on display by resident artists. At the conclusion of your visit, re-board your coach and commence the approximately 45-minute drive back to the pier.

Stornoway, Lewis Isle, Parish and Port of Ness, Harbour Area, Harbour View Gallery, Free Time

Upon arrival, some free time is made available to explore this traditional fishing village at your leisure. You can take a delightful stroll about the harbour area, and visit the Harbour View Gallery to admire the artwork on display.

St. Moluag Church, Butt of Lewis Lighthouse, Lighthouse and Ocean Views

Next, re-board your coach and continue on to St. Moluag Church. Upon arrival, take a guided tour of this ancient church and learn about its mysterious legacy. Afterward, re-board your coach and head to the Butt of Lewis Lighthouse, which is situated in a stunning location. The Butt of Lewis Lighthouse was constructed in 1862, and, unlike many other Scottish lighthouses, was built from red brick. During an exterior photo stop here, take in excellent views of the lighthouse and out to sea. This area is noted in the *Guinness Book of Records* as the windiest place in the United Kingdom. At the conclusion of your visit, re-board your coach and commence the approximately 70-minute drive back to the pier.

Stornoway, Lewis Isle, West Coast, Callanish Standing Stones, Visitor's Centre, Stones Walk

The stones stand like a petrified forest on the flat top of a peninsula which reaches out into East Loch Roag. Visit the excellent Visitor's Centre to learn more about the site, and venture out amongst the stones to experience their mysterious atmosphere.

Dun Carloway Pictish Broch

Next, re-board your coach and continue around the west coast of Lewis Isle to the site of the Dun Carloway Pictish Broch. Probably built some time in the last century B.C., it would have occasionally served as a defensible residence for an extended family, with accommodation for animals at ground floor level. It would also have served as a visible statement of power and status in the local area.

Gearrannan Blackhouse Village, Traditional Blackhouses, Museum, Crofting Demonstration

Your tour continues with a drive north to the Gearrannan Blackhouse Village, a reconstructed settlement of traditional blackhouses where people and animals lived in close proximity. The houses were made using dry, stone masonry, and have thatched roofs distinctively weighted down with rocks. During your guided tour, visit the small museum, observe a display of a typical crofting activity such as weaving or butter-making (subject to availability), and take in splendid views from this dramatic site on the wild Atlantic coast. At the conclusion of your visit, re-board your coach and commence the approximately one-hour drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking for approximately 547 yards (about 500 metres), at times over uneven, soft, and grassy surfaces and inclines, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach and many steps at the sites visited. Experience life in an ancient, Iron Age Village during this unforgettable, half-day sightseeing excursion to Bostadh Beach.

Stornoway, Isle of Great Bernera, Bostadh Beach, Iron Age Village of Bostadh

Depart the pier for the scenic, approximately 75-minute drive west towards the Isle of Great Bernera. Upon arrival, a visit is made to the Iron Age Village of Bostadh, located on a beautiful beach on the far-west-side of Lewis Isle. After a severe storm in the Spring of 1992, a series of stone structures were exposed at Bostadh Beach. A programme of excavations in 1996 revealed a complex of houses beneath the sand. It was then decided to backfill this site in order to preserve these structures.

Guided Walking Tour, House Tops, Life-Sized 'Jelly Baby' House Replica, Coastal Views

During your guided walking tour, the tops of two of the houses can be seen in the beach area, where the ever-changing dune landscape exposes, then re-covers, parts of the original structures. The main attraction now is the life-sized replica of one of these 'jelly baby' houses; so-called because of their distinctive shape. Your stroll around this remarkable reconstruction offers a unique insight into the life of the inhabitants of this ancient community. At the conclusion of your visit, re-board the coach and commence the approximately 1.5-hour drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking for approximately 547 yards (about 500 metres), at times over uneven, soft, and sandy surfaces and inclines, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach. Stornoway Walking Tour, Seafront, Bridge, Coastline, Woodlands, Gardens

From here, your path climbs gently through the forest to the highest point of the castle's grounds, located on Gallows Hill where once the town's gallows stood. From this viewpoint, take in spectacular panoramic views of Stornoway and its surrounds. This area also features evidence of prehistoric settlements dating back to 4000 B.C., including the largest number of Neolithic and Bronze Age monuments around Stornoway.

Lews Castle and Museum nan Eilean Tour

Finally, reach the impressive mock Tudor Castle, the lavishly-appointed Lews Castle. This Victorian-Era home was utilised as a naval hospital during World War II, a period during which the groomed woodlands fell into a wild state and the fantastic glasshouses dilapidated. We will have free time here to explore the Museum nan Eilean. At the conclusion of your visit, commence the approximately 30-minute walk back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking for approximately 0.74 miles (about 1.2 kilometres), at times over uneven, slippery, and cobblestone surfaces and inclines, with many steps to negotiate at the castle. Tórshavn

It began with a Viking "Thing" (original Norse assembly), followed by a market, later it became a thriving town and today it is one of the smallest and most pleasant capital cities in the world. Tórshavn today blends the historical and picturesque with all the features of a modern city. Discover quality restaurants and hotels, conference facilities, interesting museums, discotheques, cinema, live theatre, exhibitions, sports facilities, parks and of course, excellent shopping. The town and the surrounding areas are ideal for window-shopping and pleasant strolls.

Many extended excursions to the rest of the Faroes begin from the harbour. As Tórshavn is located in the centre of the country, the well-developed bus and ferry service can whisk you away to almost every corner of the Faroes and back again the same day.

Tinganesand Skansin

At this historical section of Tórshavn, make a short stop at Skansin to explore the old fort before continuing up to the beautiful Nordic House cultural centre. Drive through the modern sections of the city and before heading back to the harbour, stop briefly at a viewpoint overlooking the capital.

Please note: This tour involves an extensive amount of walking and is not suitable for guests with limited mobility or guests who utilise a wheelchair. The order of sites visited may vary.

THO-B / VESTMANNA SEA CLIFFS

Enjoy a unique perspective on the Faroe Islands' spectacular scenery from both land and sea.

Departing the harbor, drive alongside fjords where many waterfalls cascade from craggy mountains into tranquil waters. Pass through tunnels carved from ancient rock and enjoy magnificent vistas of a lake-filled valley before descending to Vestmanna - a colourful village on the western coast of Streymoy.

From here, enjoy an unforgettable boat trip with the direction of the current dictating whether you cruise north or south. To the north see ever more dramatic cliffs with sheep grazing high on their grassy tops. At the northernmost point of the journey, enter sea caverns and traverse channels between freestanding rock formations and coastal cliffs where seabirds including puffins and guillemots are often seen swirling above.

Turning south from Vestmanna you would cross the narrow sound and see the island of Vágur rising dramatically before you. Hugging the eastern coast the route passes spectacular gorges cut by the ever-present energy of water. Sea birds including puffins and guillemots can often be seen where they nest on sea cliffs. At the southernmost point of the journey sail beneath Troll Wife's Finger, an amazing pinnacle of rock standing sentinel to Vágur Island. From Vestmanna enjoy stunning views from the scenic ridge top road as you return to Torshavn.

Please note: This tour involves little walking with few steps to negotiate and is suitable for guests with limited mobility or guests who utilise a wheelchair; however guests must be able to embark and disembark the coach and boat.

THO-C / HOME VISIT WITH A FAROESE FAMILY

Home Visit

A Faroese family opens the doors to their home and invites you in. Your hosts will serve light refreshments including coffee, tea, and home baked cake. This visit will give you an excellent opportunity to make acquaintance with locals and to see how a Faroese family lives. Learn the way of life and engage in an enlightening discussion of cultures, economics and heritage.

On your return to the harbour, a stop at a viewpoint overlooking Tórshavn, will allow you a wonderful photo opportunity and the perfect end to this unique intimate experience.

Please note: This tour involves very little walking but is not suitable for guests with limited mobility or guests who utilise a wheelchair due to the stairs involved. Participation in this tour is extremely limited.

THO-D / HIKE TO STREYMOY SILL

Peace, tranquillity and stunning vistas can be enjoyed during this leisurely mile-and-a half (2.5 kilometre) hike that takes you closer to the nature of the Faroe Islands.

Depart Tórshavn by coach and ascend the mountain road glimpsing fjords and distant islands until reaching approximately 216 yards (200 metres) above sea level. From here, embark on a cross-country trek in the company of knowledgeable local guides. The first 216 yards (200 metres) of the hike is strenuous after which you can relax and appreciate the fascinating landscapes as they unfold.

Streymoy Sill

Pause on top of the columnar basalt of Streymoy Sill. This fascinating volcanic formation was sculpted smooth by glaciers and glacial etchings are still visible. Stretching below is the sea with the island of Vagar beyond. In this remote area the ethereal silence is punctuated only by the sounds of nature. Enjoy these magnificent surroundings before returning to the coach. The return to Torshavn is via a tunnel that emerges at the Kaldbakfjord where gentle waterfalls and wandering sheep complete the tranquil picture.

Please Note: This tour involves an approximate 1.5 mile (2-kilometre) hike where the first 216 yards (200 metres) up a steep hill is strenuous; participants should be in good physical condition. This tour is not suitable for guests with limited mobility or guests who utilise a wheelchair. It is necessary to descend the same steep slope at the end of the hike. During your visit, you are invited to walk the short distance, 'over the Atlantic'.

Sea Stacks and Slættaratindur Mountain

Along the way, take in a splendid view of two very distinctive sea stacks known as 'The Giant and the Hag', and pass by the highest mountain in the Faroe Islands, the approximately 2,894-foot-high (about 882-metre-high) Slættaratindur.

Gjógv Village, Pancakes and Tórshavn Viewpoint

Upon arrival in Gjógv Village, see the approximately 617-foot-long (about 188-metre-long) gorge that serves as a natural harbour for fishing boats, and stop for pancakes and coffee at a local guesthouse. Following your visit, re-board your coach and head to the Tórshavn Viewpoint, which overlooks the capital. After a brief photo stop here, re-board your coach and commence the short drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking for approximately 0.6 miles (about one kilometre), at times over uneven and cobblestone surfaces and small hills, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach. Walking across the bridge is at the discretion of each guest. This tour is not suitable for guests with limited mobility and guests who utilise a wheelchair. HEI-A / BOAT TOUR AROUND HEIMAEY

Indulge your senses with the natural beauty and bird-life of the Westman Islands during this picturesque sightseeing voyage around Heimaey. Depart Heimaey Harbour via boat and set sail for your circumnavigation of Heimaey. Proceed past the cliffs surrounding the harbour, which has long been a shelter for the Icelandic fishing fleet but was nearly lost due to a volcanic eruption on the island in 1973.

Along the way, pass by bird colonies with millions of inhabitants and explore caves that can only be visited by boat. The Westman Islands are home to one of the largest varieties of seabird species in Iceland, including puffin colonies that are home to an estimated six-to-eight-million puffins. Please note that all puffins leave the island around mid-August, so no puffins will be seen on the tour. The islands also include one of the world's largest gannet and guillemot colonies, along with numerous other species of nesting seabirds.

In addition to the bird life, orcas, dolphins and porpoises are often sighted. After viewing the island and bird cliffs from every angle, sail into the cliff-cave of Klettshellir, where a musical instrument is played on board the boat. The acoustics in the cave provide a memorable listening experience. Following your tour, return to the harbor, after disembarking the sightseeing boat, walk back to the tender landing point.

Please note: This tour involves a minimal amount of walking; however, the surfaces on the boat may be slippery, and boat shoes are recommended. This tour is not suitable for guests with limited mobility and guests who utilize a wheelchair. Operation of this tour is subject to weather conditions, and, at times, impossible to navigate. Depart the perfectly formed natural harbor with its tall cliffs and head to Herjólfssdalur Valley, where your guide points out ruins of old farmhouses dating from the year 650 A.D. Your tour continues along the western part of the island to view the outer islands. The youngest island, Surtsey, evolved from a volcanic eruption in 1963. A photo stop is then made at Stórhöfði, which offers splendid views overlooking the island and majestic glaciers of mainland Iceland.

The tour then continues along the scenic western part of the island, providing an opportunity to view the outer islands of archipelago. The youngest island, "Surtsey", a UNESCO World Heritage Site, was formed in a volcanic eruption in 1962

Volcanoes and Pompeii of the North

Your drive back to the harbour takes you between two volcanoes, the 5,000-year-old Helgafell, or 'Holy Mountain', and the considerably younger Eldfell, or 'Mt. Fire', which last erupted on January 23, 1973. Stop for photos at the viewpoint located at the base of Eldfell; then continue over the new lava fields and into the very centre of the volcano's crater. From here, drive through town, pass by the Skansinn Church and stop by Pompeii of the North before returning to the pier.

Eldheimar Museum

You will get the chance to visit the Eldheimar museum, which focuses on the 1973 volcanic eruption in Vestmannaeyjar, Iceland's largest natural disaster - where inhabitants of the island had to evacuate their home in the middle of the night.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking, with short walks at stops over uneven surfaces, and is not suitable for guests with limited mobility and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Comfortable, closed-toe walking shoes are recommended. The tour sequence may vary.

HEI-C / WESTMAN ISLAND WALKING TOUR

Heimaey and Volcanoes

Depart the pier for a guided walking tour of Heimaey. Your tour begins with a look at the 5,000-year-old Helgafell Volcano, whose eruption on January 23, 1973 created a new volcano, Eldfell. See the grassy hills of Eldfell and the fences put in place there to hold down the ashes. This area was the same height as the houses to the left of it, and considered to be the best farmland on the island. The top of Eldfell is still warm to this day.

Pompeii of the North, Eldheimar Museum

Next, your walk continues on to Pompeii of the North. This area was unearthed in 2004 when islanders began digging out the houses buried in the volcano. The fissure created by the volcano was only 650 feet (200 metres) from Kirkjubær, the easternmost farm on the island. More than 400 houses were destroyed during the eruption, and new houses have since been built on the west coast of the island.

You will get the chance to visit the Eldheimar museum, which focuses on the 1973 volcanic eruption in Vestmannaeyjar, Iceland's largest natural disaster - where inhabitants of the island had to evacuate their home in the middle of the night.

Harbour Entrance and Skansinn Church

Before the eruption, the harbor was unprotected from the eastern winds and the entrance was 2,624 feet (800 meters) in width. Today, it is only 525 feet (160 meters) wide, and one of the safest harbors in Iceland. A stop is also made at the Skansinn Church, a former fort built in 1586 and then rebuilt in 1630. Lava destroyed most of the fort; however, ruins of a seawater tank and electricity bollards remain. Your walking tour concludes at the pier.

Please note: This tour involves an extensive amount of walking for approximately two hours over uneven, gravel and grass surfaces, with some uphill walking and steps to negotiate. This tour is not suitable for guests with limited mobility and guests who utilize a wheelchair. Comfortable, closed-toe walking shoes are recommended. The tour sequence may vary.

REK-D / THE GOLDEN CIRCLE WITH ICELANDIC HORSE SHOW

Thingvellir National Park

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From Reykjavik drive over the Mosfellsheidi hill to beautiful Thingvellir National Park, a place of tremendous interest as a primary site of both Iceland's geological and historical heritage. It was here in 930 AD that the Vikings formed the Althingi the oldest still-existing parliament in the world. In 2004 the site of Thingvellir was inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List.

Gullfoss

Travel over the Lyngdalsheidi hill into the fertile farmlands of the south, to visit Gullfoss golden waterfall considered by many to be the most beautiful in the country. Lunch is served at a local restaurant in the Gullfoss area. A few minutes drive from Gullfoss is the Great Geysir area which has given a name to hot springs all over the world. Here you will see one of the most active geysers in the area, Strokkur, spouting up to 30 meters every few minutes.

Fridheimar

Proceed to Fridheimar for professional display of the history and gaits of the Icelandic horse. The show is aimed at being both educational and entertaining at the same time. It gives an insight into one of the most magnificent horse breeds in the world, a breed that has been intertwined with the culture and history of the Icelandic nation through the centuries. After the show guests are invited into a stable where they can have some coffee, get close to the horses, take pictures and chat with the show riders.

Perlan (Vintage point)

Visit Perlan, where you can see beautiful 360° views over Reykjavík

Afterwards, return to the ship via Reykjavik city centre.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking on gravel, mud and loose stones. It is not suitable for guests with limited mobility or guests who utilise a wheelchair. An optional walk down to Gullfoss Waterfalls involves approximately 100 steps, however falls can be viewed without this walk. Roads leading to some sites may be uneven. Thingvellir National Park, Cold Valley and Langjökull Glacier

Depart the pier aboard a modified, off-road super-truck for the scenic, approximately 45-minute drive to Thingvellir National Park, an UNESCO World Heritage Site. After entering the park, explore the landscape of Iceland's early parliament. Delving into the majestic hinterland, drive along the dramatic Cold Valley to Langjökull Glacier (Long Glacier). Langjökull is approximately 4,460 feet (about 1,359 metres) in length and approximately 4,000 feet (about 1,219 metres) above sea level, and spans an area of approximately 366 square miles (about 948 square kilometres). Upon arrival at the Langjökull Glacier, your expert driver takes your super-truck adventure to the next level during a once-in-a-lifetime journey over the ice and snow to the Ice Cave.

Ice Cave, Chapel and Bar, and White-and-Blue Ice

Located on the flanks of Iceland's second-largest glacier, the Ice Cave is located approximately 100 feet (about 30.5 metres) below the glacier's surface, and stretches approximately 800 feet (about 244 metres) in length. This amazing new attraction is a man-made cave that stretches deep into the glacier, and consists of a series of tunnels and caves carved through solid glacial ice. There is also an Ice Chapel and an Ice Bar. Crevasses that pull the glacier apart, along with sunlight penetrating the packed ice, are among the natural wonders to be seen during your guided visit. This cave-like tunnel leads into the icy underground, and, as the ice gets older, the colour changes from white to a magnificent, deep blue.

Húsafell, Lunch, Hraunfoss and Barnafoss Waterfalls, and Tunnel

Your guided glacier visit includes an introduction to glaciology, and an opportunity to learn about the effect climate change has on glaciers. The cave also provides glaciologists, meteorologists and other scientists with the ability to study the glacier in a new way. After this amazing experience, re-board your supertruck head back to the woodlands of Húsafell and proceed for lunch at a local restaurant. After lunch, your drive continues on to the nearby Hraunfoss and Barnafoss waterfalls; two of Iceland's most picturesque cascades. Following your visit, re-board your coach and commence the approximately 100-minute drive back to the pier via the Hvalfjörður Tunnel and coastline.

Please note: This tour involves an extensive amount of off-road driving and a moderate amount of walking for approximately 0.93 miles (about 1.5 kilometres), at times over uneven, natural and icy surfaces and inclines, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the off-road vehicle and at the sites visited. This tour is not suitable for pregnant guests, guests with back and/or neck problems, guests with heart or respiratory problems, guests prone to motion sickness, guests with a fear of tunnels, guests with limited mobility, and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Stóra Eldborg

From the pier board a modified Super Truck and head off on 45-minute drive to Selvík. The first stop is at the perfectly formed approximately 3,000 year old lava ring of Stóra Eldborg "Big Fire City" where you will take invigorating trek up the steep flanks of the crater, enjoying breathtaking views of the lunar-like surroundings on your way to the top.

Lava-Tube Caving Experience

After the descent, re-board your vehicle and following a short drive and subsequent walk over spongy moss and uneven ground. Gear up, donning obligatory safety helmets, grab your high beam torch and embark on a journey into the mysterious depths of the Icelandic underworld.

Krýsuvík

Continue on with a visit to the bubbling hot springs and fumaroles at the high temperature thermal field of Krýsuvík - located in the middle of the fissure zone which traverses Iceland.

Grindavík

Then travel to the nearby fishing village of Grindavík for a lobster soup served with fresh bread.

Eldvörp

Your last stop of the day is at the amazing Eldvörp geosite - a 10km long row of scoria and spatter cones formed in the Reykjanes fires 1210-1240.

After another bumpy ride down to the road, it is time to return to Reykjavík and the ship.

Please note: This tour requires extensive activity and guests must be at least 12 years old and in excellent physical condition. It is not recommended for anyone who suffers with back/neck problems or for pregnant women. It is not suitable for guests who utilise a wheelchair or those with limited mobility. The tour operates in Super Trucks and some off-roading can be very bumpy. Due to the substantial walking, hiking and caving, this tour is considered a grade 4 hike. Dressing in layers, bringing a waterproof jacket and wearing sturdy, non-slip or rubber-soled shoes are recommended. Order of sights may vary. A minimum number of participants is required in order for this programme to operate.

Guests with flights departing after 6 p.m. can experience the spectacular natural wonders of the 'Golden Circle' during this panoramic, full-day sightseeing excursion to Thingvellir, Gullfoss and Geysir.

Reykjavík, Mosfellsheidi Heath and Almannagja

Depart the pier for the scenic, approximately 45-minute drive to Thingvellir National Park. This UNESCO World Heritage Site was home to the Viking Parliament, and Iceland's geological and historical heritage. En route, traverse the Mosfellsheidi Heath and stop to view Almannagja, the location where Europe's oldest national legislative assembly, the Icelandic Althing, was established in 930 and convened every summer for nearly eight centuries.

Thingvellir National Park, Gullfoss Waterfall and Geysir Geothermal Area

Upon arrival at Thingvellir National Park, an UNESCO World Heritage Site, a visit is made to the magnificent Gullfoss Waterfall, Iceland's most beautiful waterfall. Following your visit, re-board your coach and head to the Geysir geothermal area with its multitude of hot springs. The most active one, Strokkur, spouts every few minutes.

Grimsnes Region, Hveragerdi Village and Airport Transfer

Next, proceed for a refreshment stop at a local restaurant, then return to Reykjavík through the Grimsnes region. Along the way, a comfort stop is made at Hveragerdi Village, where geothermal water has been used to build up its extensive greenhouse industry. Afterward, re-board your coach and commence the approximately 75-minute drive to Reykjavík International Airport for your flight home.

Please note: This tour is offered to guests disembarking the ship with flights from Reykjavík International Airport at 6pm or later and will end at the airport. This tour involves a moderate amount of walking for approximately 0.93 miles (about 1.5 kilometres), at times over uneven, muddy and gravel surfaces, and loose stones and inclines, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach. This tour is not suitable for guests with limited mobility and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Guests are advised to wear warm, comfortable clothing in layers and a weatherproof jacket or coat with flat, closed-toe, non-slip walking shoes, and bring sun protection and a warm hat and gloves from the ship.
